KEMPSVILLE TRIVIA

For several years prior to Cornwallis's surrender at Yorktown, Norfolk and Princess Anne County was home to many who were loyal to the British Crown. George Logan, a dry goods merchant in Kempes Landing, was a loyalist sympathizer. Logan returned to Scotland, and in his absence he was tried and convicted of treason. His dry goods

storehouse was confiscated in 1778.

In 1783 Kempsville was incorporated as a town. George Logan's dry goods store was used temporarily as a courthouse, and his wet goods store was converted into a jail. Shortly thereafter, a brick courthouse was built and a frame building was constructed as a jail. In 1780 the jail burned down and was replaced with a brick building, located behind the building we know today as Pleasant Hall. The County seat remained in Kempsville until 1824. In 1824, the county seat was moved to the old Princess Anne County Courthouse, located in the present day Virginia Beach Municipal Center. The old courthouse in Kempsville was converted into a Baptist Church and the jail became a private school, Kempsville Academy. The Kempsville courthouse was demolished in 1971, and the old jail was demolished in 1974.

As in past years, we have had a few Brothers pass to the Celestial Lodge above.

Past Master's Corner:



THE REAL ISSUE

The monument with the Ten Commandments inscribed in a government building in Alabama has been the subject of recent controversy. Critics want it removed while supporters want it left in place. Both sides argue that their freedom of speech and First Amendment rights are being violated. While the controversy in Alabama has been the recent target, the real issue is much greater and far more reaching than this one incident.

The Ten Commandments were given by God for the good of man. To try and rid ourselves of them only causes hurt to ourselves. Approximately forty years ago prayer and Bible reading were disallowed in the public schools. Today we are reaping the results of that action because the very foundation of moral conduct was undermined. The founding fathers of America wrote the Constitution based on scriptural principles. The U. S. currency proclaims "In God we trust."

America has stood on that foundation for over 200 years. To remove the Ten Commandments monument is one thing but to try and remove God and His laws from our heart is quite another. It takes away the foundational basis for all of right and wrong. Who says it is wrong to steal? Who says I can lie? Who says I can kill? Who says I need to obey my parents? I am my own god. Under that principle, parents, teachers, law enforcement and government have no authority.

Little by little society in general has been removing God's laws from their life-style. They have accepted the theory of evolution and denied Creation. That is a violation of the first commandment. "I am the Lord thy God. Thou shalt have no other gods before me." They have opened the doors of business on the Sabbath. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labor and do thy work. God blessed the Sabbath day and hallowed it." For some the Sabbath is just another day of business or a day to get things done around the house. God set it apart for man to rest and receive physical refreshment and to honor Him. God said marriage between one man and one woman as long as life shall last. Society instead has accepted divorce as normal and an easy resolution to marital difficulties. Marriage has been reduced to a contract agreement between parties until one defaults. As a result, one out of every two marriages today ends in divorce and everyone suffers. Husband and wife lack trust. Children find it difficult to honor and obey a father or mother who is playing the role of parent but really aren't the true parents. It undermines discipline in the home and the school. Domestic disputes are another result of this violation of a God instituted principle.

Can you see what happens in a world where these principles and morals are undermined? It is utter chaos. Law and order have no place. Laws need only be followed if one desires. There is no right or wrong. Everything is left up to the discretion of each individual. Human life loses its value as well and is removed at will through abortion, euthanasia, or outright murder. Pause for a moment and consider the risks of traveling down the highway if everyone ignored the traffic laws and did their own thing. No speed limit. No stop signs. Cars going East and cars going West in the same lanes. That is the same kind of chaos you see when God's principles for mankind are ignored. When God's principles are followed it is for our good. When they are ignored it is our destruction.

The removal of the Ten Commandments, prayer and bible reading, etc. is simply the resolve of people to eliminate God from the equation. They don't want to answer to God for their actions. Regardless of man's efforts, God can't be eliminated. He has every right to institute laws and require a response from man because He created him and gives him every breath he takes. Man can refuse to obey God but God has outlined consequences for that refusal. The physical removal of the Ten Commandments from a government building in Alabama is simply carrying out in reality what has already taken place in principle.

A building without good foundation will crumble. America has a good foundation but it needs some major repair. She can continue to ignore God's principles or choose to follow them. God honors those who honor Him and disciplines those who don't. America's future will be a declaration of the people she represents. May we work to restore the foundation by upholding the principles that God has instituted for our good, for the good of our children and for the good of the nation.
