Unused Potential

"The average person puts only 25 percent of his energy and ability into his work. The world takes off its hat to those who put in more then 50 percent of their capacity, and stands on its head for those few and far between souls who devote 100 percent.

This observation by Andrew Carnegie portrays a scenario depicted by many employers, it is hard to find good, dependable help. Employees that are hard working, honest and dependable are in demand. They have little trouble finding a decent paying job. Obviously the economic condition and availability of jobs in a given area are determining factors as well.

It has, however, always puzzled me how you have a five or six percent unemployment rate and help wanted signs hanging in the windows at the same time. I recognize that those help wanted signs may represent lower paying, entry level positions, and may not be sufficient to support a family.

To me "Help Wanted" represents two things. One, there is an unfulfilled need, and second, there is a willingness to pay the wages. Unemployment also represents two things. One, there is an unfulfilled need, namely, food on the table, and secondly that need must be met by an alternative source, namely, unemployment compensation. Taking these factors I would assume that there could be some value in a compromise between the two. Taking a job at the place that has help wanted signs would fulfill that company's need and would in turn provide a savings to unemployment compensation by contributing a portion of the proceeds via wages. Unemployment would then pick up the remainder of the tab, rather then footing the entire bill. It would seem to me that it would be a win/win situation.

All too common as well is the mentality of "the company owes it to me." That mentality is foreign to those who learned to work hard. I especially think of those folks who went through the great depression era. They were glad for work of any kind even if it provided only a meager income.

Hannah Whitall Smith writes, "The mother eagle teaches her little ones to fly by making their nest so uncomfortable that they are forced to leave it and commit themselves to the unknown world of air outside." Perhaps the nest has become too comfortable for many. In a land of ease, and wealth, and plenty, there is a tendency to grow accustomed to giving little and receiving plenty. The end result is under developed wings that will never reach their full potential."

While this scenario is evidenced in the workplace, we can also draw an analogy in relation to church

work, our spiritual lives and our lodge. Sitting on the sidelines and giving little, produces stagnation. When people feel needed, when they become part of the work, they develop their potential, they blossom. They reach out into unfamiliar territory strengthening their wings. They expand their horizons. They grow excited. They feel rewarded as they see the results of their contributions. The more they give the more they receive in return. Eventually, the average become the extraordinary as they soar to new and greater heights in developing their full potential. They find a sense of worth and usefulness as they become a part of the solution rather than a part of the problem. This is the feeling we at Kempsville try to instill in the new Master Masons. We would appreciate your assistance in continuing the work.
