From The Secretary

You will be receiving your Lodge Dues Notice for 2008 during the next two weeks or so. Please note that the cost to you has increased by nine (9) dollars. Let me explain. Our Lodge Dues are \$56.00 per year. This has not changed for several years, and cannot change without a vote to change our by-laws. The Methodical Digest requires that the Secretary collect both Lodge Dues and Grand Lodge Dues and assessments from each member. The Grand Lodge Dues and assessments are then forwarded to Grand Lodge in one check. Several years ago, Lodge Delegates (including our own WM), voted to incrementally increase the Grand Lodge Dues and assessments, and so it was done. Each year they would increase a dollar or two,

based on the vote that had been passed. Kempsville Lodge failed to pass that cost on to the membership as they should have. The Dues and Assessments increased from \$19.00 to \$28.00 over those years. Your Lodge Treasury has been paying the difference when it actually could not afford to do so. This year, (2007), the Lodge collected \$19.00 from each of you instead of the required \$28.00, but we still payed the \$28.00 to Grand Lodge. That difference of nine dollars, multiplied by the approximately 500 members, constitutes about \$4,500 dollars this year alone. Multiply that by the several years it has gone on and you can see the losses your Lodge is taking. Of course, this money cannot be re-couped. No one could try that since the losses are self inflicted. I have, however, corrected the error and have adjusted the cost to you accordingly. Hence the increase to \$84.00 due and payable on or before January 1. 2008. Lodge Dues = \$56.00 // Grand Lodge Dues and Assessments = \$28.00. Just for your information, there are still about fifty members who have not yet paid 2007 dues. Your Lodge needs your dues to keep operating. If they are not paid by 01 January, you will be receiving citations. You will not find me as soft hearted as Right Worshipful Pierce. If you dance the dance, you got to pay the fiddler. Hope to see you in Lodge next Tuesday as the Grand Master visits Kempsville.
