veteran or a brother raised just the previous week—every time we hear our ritual we have the opportunity to gain just a bit more Light in Masonry. And lastly, you're doing it for yourself. Although qualifying for your Warden's Certificate is important, never think of our degree work as simply an opportunity to be "checked off" on a particular part of our ritual. Keep these thoughts in mind as you're participating in a degree and there's no doubt that you'll exemplify ritual that you, your Lodge, and the candidate will enjoy and be proud of.

## From The East



As the weather begins to change, I reflect on things that have changed around us. The newspaper today said the leaves on Skyline Drive had begun to turn. Speaking of turning; we turned a dream in to a reality. A

simple dream of flushing without fear. I also look at things that are changing. Brothers Ron Jacobson and Bill Rawson are changing and are ready to assume their new stations for next year. I have changed careers, a truly *scary* change. But change is a good thing. We grow and evolve. We become better brothers, better citizens, and better parents and/or children. Without change we stagnate. Without our evolution we don't look at our parents and wonder when they got old. Or we look at our children and wonder when they became adults. We don't look at the lodge and wonder what kind of change has happened. But keep in mind that change is *good*. Hard sometimes, but more often than not, it is good.

Last week was a difficult one for me. A young man, a boy really, lost his life in a tragic car accident. That is not the whole story however. This young man was a friend of my son's and I had the opportunity to coach him in baseball at the fields just up the street from the Lodge. When my son found out about the accident, he immediately got on the computer to see if he could find out what happened. We were both disturbed by what we found. This child was wanted by the police. He had not been home since September 11th. He was in a stolen jeep, driving too fast on the interstate. When the State Trooper turned on his flashers, he sped up and tried to get away. He exited the interstate at too high a rate of speed. rolled the vehicle three times and was ejected. He died on the way to the hospital. My son was disturbed by the events because he had been invited to the same party the other boy was attending. Jordan felt that if he had been there he maybe could have saved his friend from him self. I was bothered because he was on my backyard after school Tuesday afternoon. If I had known what was happening in his life, maybe I could have steered him home. This boy was loved and admired by many people, teens and adults, as evidenced by the turnout at the viewing and the

funeral. He had a big heart and was always respectful towards me, proven by the way he stood and shook my hand that Tuesday. On Thursday before the funeral my son, who is the wisest 17 year old I have had the pleasure of knowing, told me, "Yesterday and today are for Danny. Tomorrow we have to move on and live our lives." My son, who has been a rock during my last year and-a-half, had grown up before my very eyes last week. He gets it. And young people, including young Master Masons, will also "get it" if given the chance and the right kind of guidance.

As I reflect on my year in the East, I can only see good things. It has been a pleasure to serve you all. I have enjoyed the things that have occurred at the lodge this year. I am proud of so many things. I am proud of how we all came together and raised the funds for the sewer project. I am proud of the growth of both of our youth groups. Not only the physical growth in numbers, but the growth of the young men and women who participate and the support of their parents. I am proud of our Eastern Star Sisters for their support of the lodge. I am proud that 17 of us made a trip to the Eastern Shore to honor Most Worshipful Spencer MacMath Rogers on his 60<sup>th</sup> Masonic Birthday. I am proud of our Past Masters who are so easily approached for advice, and also do some pretty mean ritual. I am proud of our 11 One Day Conferral candidates who have been certified by Right Worshipful McGowan three weeks before the deadline. I am proud to be a member of this fraternity, and most importantly, I am proud to have been the Worshipful Master of the greatest Lodge in the Commonwealth.

I thank all of you for the support I have received. And I thank all of you for allowing me to serve you as your Worshipful Master.

At the end of the day, upon leaving our jobs and going home, my friend took notice of the look of angst and consternation on my face at which point he put his hand on my shoulder, looked me in the eyes, and, in the most affectionate but stern of manners told me: "Ron, if you think that your purpose in life is determined by the limitations of a job, a building, or a predefined role, then ... you have a lot to learn." He added that, "if we had been so focused on getting back to our jobs "on time," then we would have missed the opportunity of saving the lives of those that we would have otherwise left behind." As Masons, first prepared in our hearts, it is through our primary commitment to humanity that we maintain our commitment to Masonry.

My good brethren, as we wind down Masonic year 2008 under the passionate watch of Worshipful Adam, I am excited about what Masonic year 2009 will bring.
