Just wanted to share with you some events our lodge has participated in. First is the District wide Virginia

Child Identification Program at the

Pungo Strawberry Festival. Over a two day period we had 42 volunteers

from the six lodges in our district register 303 children with four machines. That is a significant increase from the previous year when we had only one machine and registered approximately 125 children.

Second was our visit to Willis V. Fentress No. 296 for the Official visit of Most Worshipful William E. Rorer, Jr., Grand Master of Masons in Virginia, to the 56th Masonic District. There were so many Brethren that three extra rows of chairs had to be placed in the North side of the lodge as well as one row in the South and West. This was a special night for Brother Chip (Winston) Graham, Willis V. Fentress' Junior Warden, since it was Junior Warden's Night. Having the Grand Master present during Junior Warden's night had to be very special to Chip, especially when the Grand Master presented Chip with his Warden's Certificate. It was also a great night for Kempsville since we had 21 Brethren present and walked away with both the State and District Traveling Gavels. This would not have been possible without your participation. Thank you!

Third was the 100 Mason's event at Bremond Lodge No. 241 on the Peninsula. That night 146 Brethren attended, including the Grand Master. There were 15 Sitting Worshipful Masters (three from the 56th Masonic District), 7 District Deputy Grand Masters (including our own Right Worshipful Dennis Edwards), and 2 Past Grand Masters (Most Worshipful Skip Parker and Most Worshipful William Purdue). Worshipful Roger Cort, and Brothers Bob Jones, Jerry Hallal and I represented Kempsville No. 196. The Grand Master gave a very moving speech about "Harmony" within the lodges and amongst the craft. We must remember to practice the tenets of our institution; Friendship, Morality and Brotherly. Additionally, not to forget the five points of Fellowship and do not allow petty differences to tear our institution apart.
