



# Masonic Trivia

Massachusetts lodges have no numbers. Pennsylvania has eleven lodges with numbers but no names. Georgia has two lodges identified as number 1, Social #1 and Solomon #1. Neither Maryland, Pennsylvania, or Tennessee has a lodge with the number 1.

The Grand Lodge of Scotland has one lodge with a zero number - i.e. Mother Kilwinning No. 0 - it is popularly known as MK0. It also has three lodges No. 1 and two lodges No.3.

The first registered livestock brand in Montana was the Square and Compasses dating back to before May 25, 1872 when brands were first registered. It is still in use today.
