The average American consumes fiftythree pounds of bread each year. It can be in the form of white bread, wheat bread, pumpernickel or rye. It takes nine seconds for a combine to

harvest enough wheat to make about seventy loaves. One bushel of wheat will produce seventythree one pound loaves and a family of four could live ten years off the bread produced on one acre of wheat.

Bread is closely tied to religious expression and communion. Hot cross buns are used to commemorate Lent and Good Friday and Jewish families celebrate the coming of the Sabbath on Friday evenings with challah, which is a light, airy yeast bread made of six long strands of dough which are braided together to form a loaf.

It is said that the ancient Egyptian rulers regulated it from production to distribution as a means of controlling their population. In France the shortage of bread was one of the reasons in triggering the eruption of the French Revolution

Bread can be eaten with beef, chicken, pork, eggs or baloney. My favorite compliment for bread is peanut butter and jelly. We have French bread, Italian bread and Russian bread. Breaking bread is the universal sign of peace and every language and culture in the world has a word for bread.
