Two hundred and thirty seven years ago we severed our ties with Great Britain and dissolved the political bands which connected us with them and assumed our separate and equal station among the powers of the earth. We declared our independence, we became a nation, we became one. The next year, a Convention of Delegates met in Williamsburg for the purpose of choosing a Grand Master to preside over the Craft in our Commonwealth. Prior and unto this, the several Lodges in the state, and former colony, were beholden unto several different Grand Lodges. They being those of England, Scotland, Ireland and two others. A motion was made, essentially ordered to lay over nearly a year, and in October 1778, the Grand Lodge of Virginia was established.

The creation of the United States of America and the Grand Lodge of Virginia follow similar paths. They are played by the same players, share a common ideology and have a familiar theme, E Pluribus Unum – out of many, one. It is an expression of unity and togetherness. It is one helping all and all helping one.

Masonic Blood Program

I felt the need to communicate a few blood donation alternatives as we will not have a July blood donation. Our July effort has been rescheduled to August 19th and will be held in our lodge social hall. I also wanted to take this opportunity to raise your awareness to the people who generally donate blood and to those who use blood.

There are many places where blood donations can be made. Bloodmobiles (mobile blood drives on specially constructed buses) travel to high schools, colleges, churches, and community organizations. People can also donate at community blood centers

and hospital-based donor centers. Many people donate at blood drives at their places of work. Community blood centers collect approximately 88 percent of the nation's blood, and hospital-based donor centers account for the other 12 percent.

Less than 5 percent of healthy Americans who are healthy enough to participate in blood donation actually do so. According to studies, the average donor is a college-educated white male, between the ages of 30 and 50, who is married and has an above-average income. However, a broad cross-section of the population donates every day. Furthermore, these "average" statistics are changing, and women and minority groups are volunteering to donate in increasing numbers. While persons 65 years and older compose 13 percent of the population, they use 25 percent of all blood units transfused.

Patients scheduled for surgery may be eligible to donate blood for themselves, a process known as autologous blood donation. In the weeks before non-emergency surgery, an autologous donor may be able to donate blood that will be stored until the surgical procedure.

I hope this message finds you all in good health and able to lend a blood donating arm to our fine community.
