The Spirit of Kempsville Lodge



On October 20, 2013, Right Worshipful William Hollowell Pierce laid down his working tools and entered the Celestial Lodge above. No other Brother has had more influence on the spirit and culture of Kempsville Lodge than Right Worshipful Bill Pierce. Affectionately known as "The Handsome One", Right Worshipful Bill Pierce was, without a doubt, the definition of a true Mason and a true gentleman.

After serving as the Worshipful Master of Great Bridge Lodge No. 257 in 1952, he, along with 29 other local Masons, petitioned the Grand Lodge of Virginia to form a Masonic Lodge in Kempsville. The dispensation was granted with Right Worshipful Bill Pierce serving as its Worshipful Master in 1954 (under dispensation) and again in 1955 at which time the Charter was granted. He was then elected as the Lodge's Secretary where he served for 50 consecutive years before moving into the Masonic Home of Virginia in 2006.

During his 67 years as a Master Mason, it's hard to imagine the number of lives he touched. His unassuming demeanor while sitting to the left of the Worshipful Master, his subtle wit, the countless number of Brethren that were coached in their

catechisms—all have helped define the culture which we know as today's Kempsville Lodge.

Although his working tools have been laid down, they are clearly well-worn and show the signs of daily use. We can only hope that when the time comes to lay down our own working tools, they are as tattered and worn as his.

The Charter may only be draped in his honor for a single month, but his memory will remain in our hearts and minds forever. His presence will surely be missed but his legacy will, without a doubt, live on. Right Worshipful Sir, you will never be forgotten.

Masonic Blood Program

As the 2013 blood donation seasons nears its end I would like to provide a few tips to prepare you for participation in our final event.

For a week or so before you donate, eat healthy, iron-rich meals. The iron in your blood helps transport oxygen and promotes healing throughout your body. Try to avoid fatty foods since they can

interfere with proper testing. On donation day wear a shirt that has sleeves that can be rolled up comfortably, eat a substantial breakfast and lunch, drink at least 16 ounces of water at least an hour before and after you donate, and follow the post-donation directions closely. These include abstaining from smoking, alcohol, heavy lifting and rigorous exercise.

Remember to bring your ID, a list of all the medications you are taking, and maybe a friend to make donating twice as fun. Reward yourself with an iron-rich meal afterwards. It takes your body approximately two weeks to replace all of the blood that you shared to save a life.

Thank you for participating in our final blood donation event for 2013, the event will take place on December 16th at Lynnhaven Lodge No. 220 from 2 to 7PM.
