From The East



Candidates for Masonry are carefully investigated before they are accepted for membership. Few organizations are more selective. To begin with, one half of the population is ineligible

because it is of the female sex. Another large segment is disqualified because of age. By long-standing tradition, members of certain religious bodies do not choose to join, although the Craft makes no impediment to their actions.

Yet others are actively debarred because they have no religious convictions at all. In fact at any given time only a small proportion of the total population qualifies for membership. Clearly then, those who do qualify and are accepted are a privileged few. The Mason should ask himself, "What are my responsibilities in return for the privilege that has been extended to me?" The responsibilities are great because the number accepted is small.

Because a Mason is one of those few, he must not become introverted and assume that Masonry is only for his personal use, his own self-satisfaction. This would be selfish. On the contrary, it is his duty and responsibility to share the teachings and philosophy of Masonry with those whom he meets. A practicing Mason has a day-to-day duty to be an effective promoter of the Art. It would be unfortunate if he took the view that he could discharge his responsibilities simply by attending regular and emergent meetings of his lodge. This is but one type of activity expected of him. He will endeavor to make a daily advancement in his own understanding of Masonry and will apply and extend his influence for the betterment of mankind in whatever environment he finds himself.

Therefore, one of a Mason's prime responsibilities lies in helping to recommend and sponsor worthy candidates for membership. After an aspirant has stated his wish and indicated his intent, his sponsor must be certain and satisfied that, if he is admitted, he will fully meet the requirements for membership. The Committee of Investigation appointed by the Master of the lodge will seek

information about the applicant, such as who he is and with whom he associates, where he lives, when he became interested in Masonry, what his reasons are for submitting an application and how he intends to serve Freemasonry.

As a Mason ponders how best to discharge his Masonic responsibilities, the following quotation might well serve as a guideline. "I shall pass through this world but once; any good thing therefore that I can do or any kindness that I can show to any human being, let me do it now, let me not defer it or neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again."



From the Secretary


ARTICLE VIII of our by-laws states:

The Morlock Award

The Morlock award (named in memory of Most Worshipful Werner Herman Morlock, Grand Master of Masons in Virginia, 1993-94) is presented to Lodges that have shown exemplary participation in giving to the Masonic Home of Virginia. This award recognizes the number of active donors, not necessarily the total dollars given. This is the most significant award which can be presented to a Lodge for their gifts to the Masonic Home of Virginia. Kempsville Lodge will need approximately 75 contributing members in order to qualify for this award in 2014.

Masonic Warmth And Light

It was a tale of Masonic men surround a campfire in the old west, at night, discussing the Fraternity and it's teachings. One old man listened patiently, and finally spoke up. I can tell you more about Masonry in a little example than some of the great Masonic philosophers can in books. Everyone stand up, and gather around the campfire in a circle. Now everyone hold hands with the man next to him. Now, what do you see, looking ahead? The face of a brother Mason through the flames. What do you feel in front of you? The warmth of the fire and the comfort it brings on a cool night. What do you feel at your side? The warm hand of a brother. OK. Now drop hands and turn around. Now, what do you see? Complete darkness. What do you feel, looking ahead? A sense of loneliness, of being alienated. What do you feel at your side? Nothing at all. What do you feel at your backside? The warmth of the fire. So it is with Freemasonry, said the old man. In Masonic gatherings, you can feel the warming of Masonic interactions, you can see the face of a brother through the light Masonry brings to you, and you can always feel the warm hand of a brother. When you turn away from Masonry, and are out in the world, you see the darkness, feel alienated and alone, and do not feel the warm hand of a Brother Mason. But Masonry and the warm light it brings are just a turn away from you.
