As I said in lodge that night, if it weren't for those 2 guys I would still be an Entered Apprentice.

We only have a few things left on the docket before we go dark for the Holidays: Grand Annual communication in Richmond, the November and Annual Stated Communications, most likely raising Worshipful Bobby Spruill's grandson Logan, and our Installation. Those should be great events and I hope you are able to make it out to one or all of them. Especially for the collard green supper at the Annual Stated!

Beyond those last functions, I'd like to call your attention to your Holiday plans with a few safety thoughts for your and your family's collective well-being:

tells you when hanging the lights or you may be the one that gets hung.

- Practice good safety habits when preparing firewood for that cozy fireplace, don't chop wood in the dark. But if one thing leads to another and she has to chop wood in the dark, be a gentleman and go out and hold a lantern for her so she can see to chop.

And one added by me:


10. Fellowship, fellowship, and fellowship!
