After Prayer - Singing

At our first stated meeting in January, we re-introduced singing into our lodge. The first song was an old favorite, Irving Berlin's "God Bless America." As was our custom, the song followed the pledge of allegiance to the flag. However, two other songs were introduced and need some explanation. Masons are not strangers to music. Those of us who have participated in a Table Lodge know the important role that music plays in that event. Several of you have attended lodges under the auspices of the United Grand Lodge of England and have experienced singing in those lodges.

My wife and I travelled to London during the summer of 2015 and visited The United Grand Lodge of England. Following our tour of that most impressive building, we stopped in the gift shop and found [among other things] a book entitled Masonic Lodge and Chapter Music. Briefly glancing through the book, I realized my immediate need of purchasing this long sought after treasure. Among its many interesting selections are several Opening Odes and Closing Odes. An ode is a poem meant to be sung.

Opening Ode

Hail Eternal! by whose aid All created things were made: Heav'n and earth Thy vast design; Hear us, Architect Divine!

May our work; begun in Thee, Ever blest with order be, And may we, when labours cease, Part in harmony and peace.

By Thy glorious Majesty,| By the trust we place in Thee, By the badge and mystic sign, Hear us, Architect Divine!

Closing Ode

Now the evening shadows closing, Warn from toil to peaceful rest; Mystic arts and rites reposing, Sacred in each faithful breast.

Humbly now we bow before Thee, Grateful for Thy aid Divine; Everlasting power and glory, Mighty Architect! be Thine.

God of Light! whose love unceasing Doth to all Thy works extend; Crown our Order with Thy blessing, Build, sustain us to the end.

Both odes have three stanzas. Our guest speaker in January mentioned the Masonic significance of the number three and how it was expressed in the music of Mozart. The Senior Deacon's Lecture in the Fellowcraft Degree teaches about the three steps and their allusions. The first stanza of the Opening Ode addresses the Great Creator of the Universe. The second stanza presents our petition, asking for blessings on our work and our lodge. The third stanza concludes with the reasons we are able to ask, and to request our petition be heard.

The Closing Ode begins by stating the time and our condition. The second stanza states our posture, appreciation for assistance, and recognition of the greatness of the Mighty Architect. The third and final stanza concludes much like the Master's Charge at the Altar, and presents our petition of continued blessing. Notice the verb in the last line, "Build." We are reminded that we are continually being "fitted as living stones for that house, not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

As we sing these odes throughout the year, may they become more meaningful to us, and give us more insights as to what it means for us to be Masons.



Masonic Ethics


A man can never hurt or help natural forces. He can spread his sail, but that does not affect the wind. He can send his wireless messages through space, but that does not change the structure of the atmosphere. A man does not have much choice in his dealings with nature. If he steps from a roof he immediately falls to the earth, whatever be his opinions of gravity.

A man's relationship with his fellow men is very different. He can hurt or help them, bless or curse. What he says may change the course of another's fortunes: what he does may be a matter of life and death to a fellow. And all that he does to and with his fellows is largely under the control of his own will, for he can choose to act or not to act, to think or not to think, to speak or not to speak, and he can so choose when he knows that his words or deeds will influence them greatly one way or another. This is also true of a man's own self, and his relationship with himself: he can make his own person the object of his thoughts and acts for good or ill, and, as these thoughts and acts are of his own choosing, he is responsible, and they become a part of his conduct. All the ways in which a man affects himself, and in which men affect each other, for which men are responsible, comprise the materials of morality, of which ethics is the science.

Freemasonry has its own interpretation of the Principles of morality. For reasons of its own it emphasizes certain duties, and encourages certain ideals. In order to persuade men to act in a certain way it brings to bear upon them certain influences and strives to neutralize other influences which may oppose its purposes. It knows what it wants a man to be, and human society in general to be, and it bends its efforts towards that end. Masonic Ethics is ethics studied from this particular point of view, in the light of Masonic principles and ideals, and in behalf of Masonic purposes. It is the study of ethics as it bears on Masonry and of Masonry as it bears on ethics. Such a study bulks large in literature of the Craft, in its philosophy, in its teachings, its ritual, and its traditions, because Masonry is above all other things a moralistic institution, which strives to realize on earth a definite ideal of conduct, both private and public.
