Our Working Tools

When our lodge was still under dispensation, Norview Lodge No. 113 gave us our working tools. Over the years they have been used in all our degree work and displayed at our Stated Meetings resulting in the plaque showing some wear. There were several coats of paint on the plaque, the hooks were bent or misplaced, and it was not the pride and joy of the lodge that it needed to be. The plaque was sent out with the furniture to be refinished. It came back, re-done and stunning. Now it commands the attention it deserves in the room.

What is the condition of your working tools? Each of us was presented with our working tools in each of the three degrees. What we do with them and how often we use them are up to us as is how we take care of them. Seeing the changes in our lodge room tools, makes us want to check the location and condition of the working tools we were given.

- Using the twenty four inch gauge, ask yourself how balanced is your life? Is it equally divided? Is the "service of God, and relief of a distressed worthy brother" number 1?
- How well is your common gavel working at breaking off the corners of your rough stones? Often times the vices and superfluities of life grow and get the best of us. Our lives should become smoother and more usable by the builder.
- Check your posture. Are you walking uprightly before God and man? Your plumb can assist you in being the man you need to be in life.
- Are you acting virtuously? The square will help. Don't cut corners. Do the right thing.
- Do you think you are entitled to special treatment? There are times that our egos get in the way and we may think we are better than others. Remind the king about his blood. We are traveling together "to that undiscovered country...." Remember your level.
- How much "brotherly love and affection" have you spread lately? Are you busy building up the body, or picking it apart? Do you ask yourself how can I best work and have I been an agreeable sort? Get out your trowel and spread some of that cement "that unites us into one sacred band or society of friends and brothers" and emulate your hard-working brethren.



Tools are meant to be used. Some of us even have tool sheds and work rooms where we can be busy. Each tool has a place, and some tools are better for certain tasks than others. From time to time, we may have to remove grime, rust, or simply clean our tools. It is amazing to see how beautiful our lodge tools are now that they have been cleaned, the gold decoration touched up, and the plaque refinished. Our Masonic tools are no different. Use them all "indiscriminately, but more especially the trowel."


Bobby Gene Spruill

Blood Program

Let us talk about the importance of platelet donations.

Platelets are blood cells that help control bleeding. When a blood vessel is damaged, platelets collect at the site of the injury and temporarily repair the tear. Platelets then activate substances in plasma which form a clot and allow the wound to heal.

Many lifesaving medical treatments require platelet transfusions. Cancer patients, those receiving organ or bone marrow transplants, victims of traumatic injuries, and patients undergoing open heart surgery require platelet transfusions to survive. One platelet donation can provide as many platelets as 12 to 18 whole blood donations. This helps keep a person with cancer and a weakened immune systems from being exposed to many donors.

Try and find the time to donate platelets at your local Red Cross Apheresis center.
