Fleet Admiral King received his Masonic degrees in 1935 in George C. Whiting Lodge #22 (now Potomac Lodge No. 5) in Washington, DC. He received his Royal Arch degrees in 1938 in San Diego, California. Additionally, he was a member of the Knight Templar Commandery and the Al Koran Shrine in Cleveland, Ohio.


33rd Annual Bull Roast - June 4th

Blood Program

Effective May 2016, the Food and Drug Administration is increasing the minimum acceptable hemoglobin level for male blood and platelet donors from 12.5 g/dL to 13.0 g/dL. This new criteria will be implemented by all blood centers. This week, some donors will begin receiving communication from the American Red Cross in regards to this upcoming change.

The Red Cross tests all donors' hemoglobin levels prior to a donation to ensure they have a high enough level to be able to give blood safely.

Hemoglobin is a protein in red blood cells that contains iron and gives blood its red color. It is responsible for carrying oxygen from your lungs to nourish the tissues throughout the body.

Our next drive is at Kempsville Lodge on April 18th and sponsored by our lodge. I could use some help at noon to set up the tables for the drive and then some kitchen and service help during the drive. One or two brothers to assist to reset the dining area after the drive is complete at 7PM.

The Elements of Masonic Strength

Some lodges are small, and some are large; some are poor, and some are rich; some are weak, and some are strong; some are declining, and some are increasing; some are Masonically dead, and some are full of Masonic life. The facts are the same in all jurisdictions, and have been the same through all periods of time. There were feeble Masonic associations in the days of the origin of Masonry, and there were those that were flourishing.

Many of the causes of feebleness are wholly external to the lodge, and the lodge is not responsible for them—such as a sparse population, and a commnity bitterly opposed to the fraternity. The Grand Lodge must take things as it finds them, and do the best that circumstances will allow. Such lodges should receive aid and sympathy, and not censure.

But the causes of feebleness are generally internal. They are found quite often in the character of the individuals composing the lodge. The truth is—to be strongly asserted and deeply felt—that feeble, selfish, inconsistent Masons, make feeble lodges. Energetic Masons, full of good works and devotion to Masonic principles, whether rich or poor, few or many in number, constitute the strong lodges. It is not money, nor talent, nor position, that gives stength, but ready hands, warm hearts, and willing minds. It is not the want of money which produces weakness, but the want of disposition to use it.
