

Location, Location, Location

In the back of my mind, I thought that Conrad Hilton had said this about his hotels. Doing a quick search, I can't seem to find that information. Jeff Bezos said, "Real estate is the key cost of physical retailers. That's why there's the old saw: location, location, location." While visiting in Virginia Beach Lodge in August, this old saw came to mind during the program when the location of the altar in our Masonic Lodges was mentioned. Let's revisit these tensions.

Our altar is located equidistant between the East and the West. The East represents Wisdom and the West represents Strength. Think about how perfect that balance is, or needs to be. For if the altar is moved too close to the East, the organization becomes cerebral. Too much time is taken discussing an issue or referring it to a committee and nothing ever gets done. Taken to the extreme, all brain and no action. The opposite is also true: moved too close to the West and we get all brawn and no brains. We have all seen examples of someone doing something without thinking about it before they set to work. The results can be laughable.



The altar is also located equidistant between the South and the North. The South represents Beauty and the North represents nothingness or darkness. Perhaps you have been in a house that has nothing in it. You imagine where you might put furniture, etc. and wonder if it will fit. You may have also been in a house with so much stuff you might think it was a flea market. But, when you go into a room where everything seems to go together; the colors, patterns and fabrics are complementary; and all the items fit, you feel at ease. There needs to be beauty in all of our lives, but too much beauty can be destructive.

The altar is at the center of our lodge. There is nothing around our altar. It stands alone. Other organizations may have officers around the altar, but ours is clear to see from wherever one sits. The Master has a clear view of it at all times and should always look to it for leadership. On our altar

rests the Three Great Lights in Masonry: The Holy Bible, Square and Compasses, each of which has an important Masonic meaning. The three lesser lights illumine the great lights so we are always reminded of their teachings.

Each lodge has an altar. Every Mason has an altar, too. When was the last time you checked the location of your personal altar? Do you rely more on your brains or your strength? Is your altar leaning more towards nothingness or have you decorated it to the point you can't recognize it anymore? Are the teachings of Masonry in the center of your life or have they been pushed to the side? Finally, when was the last time you knelt at your altar and reminded yourself of the vows you took as a Mason? These tensions are always shifting in our lives. We do well to evaluate often the location of our altars.

Look Ahead – Keep Alive!

The Grand Master of Tasmania says: "Freemasonry belongs on the forward edge of the age if it is to live. To some of you that may be heresy. The easiest thing that a Mason does is to look backward. Our whole training is retrospective. It is not too much to say that we have an obsession for the past. We revere what we call the ancient landmarks.

Our ritual was forged in the bizarre atmosphere of

the eighteenth century. We have a lot to say about Solomon's Temple, and about the rebuilding of the Temple after the Exile, and about the Crusades and all the drama of medieval chivalry. Masonic education has very often meant an effort to recreate – in the modern mind – the spirit of tradition. We need that, to be sure. But I am venturing to say that our spirit must be creative as well as traditional; not either but both. This does not mean any departure from our ancient landmarks. It means that we must so live our Freemasonry that it will be a guiding light in the stupendous changes that are taking place in all sides of life all over the world."
