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Brother Bradley Douglas "Brad" Paisley

Brother Bradley Douglas "Brad" Paisley (Hiram Lodge No. 4. Franklin, TN). Brother Paislev is an American country music singer and songwriter, and a 32nd Degree Mason in the Scottish Rite. He has released ten studio albums which have all been certified Gold or higher, and has scored 32 top 10 singles on the US Billboard Country Airplay chart, 19 of which have reached number 1. He set a new record in 2009 for most consecutive singles (ten) reaching the top spot on that chart. Brother Paisley has sold over 12 million albums and won three Grammy Awards, 14 Academy of Country Music Awards, 14 Country Music Association Awards, and two American Music Awards. He has earned country music's crowning achievement, becoming a member of the Grand Ole Opry.

Born in Glen Dale, West Virginia on October 28, 1972, Brother Paisley began playing guitar at the age of eight. His first real break arrived when his junior high school principal invited him to play at the



local Rotary Club, where Tom Miller, the program director of WWVA, one of the major country radio stations in the market, heard him and extended an invitation for him to play on the station's Saturday night show Jamboree USA. Over the next eight years, he appeared weekly on Jamboree USA, opening for such stars as Little Jimmy Dickens, Roy Clark, Ricky Skaggs, and the Judds. He stayed at Jamboree USA as he graduated high school and enrolled at West Liberty State College, where he spent two years before earning a full scholarship at Belmont University in Nashville, Tennessee.

He is the only child of Brother Douglas Edward "Doug" Paisley (33rd Degree), who along with previously mentioned country music superstar Brother James Cecil Dickens (Little Jimmy Dickens) also of Hiram No. 4 encouraged him to join the Craft. Since taking his degrees he has used his fame to benefit the fraternity, by doing several public service announcements on behalf of Shriners International, Scottish Rite Charities, and the Order of the DeMolay.

Brother Paisley has performed charity concerts for Shriners Hospitals for Children, he has made numerous visits to Shriners Hospitals were he met with families, he has supported Scottish Rite Veterans Support Groups such as the Washington, DC based "Tough Mudders," and has supported veterans groups at venues across the country including The White House. Outside of his Masonic efforts, in 2001 he created his own charitable fund The Brad Paisley Foundation which supports the Children's Miracle Network, Shriner's Hospitals, St. Jude Research Hospital, The American Cancer Society, the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, plus many local Upper Ohio Valley Charities from his home area. He set up the Brad Paisley Celebrity Invitational Fishing Tournament in aid of the St Jude Children's Research Hospital. He has also supported the Michael J. Fox Foundation for Parkinson's Disease Research, the Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation, Wal-Mart's Take a Kid Fishing Day, the Salvation Army's Angel Tree program, and the T.J. Martell Foundation. In 2004, he was awarded the Country Radio Broadcaster's Artist Humanitarian Award.

Brother Paisley is a living example of a man who was first prepared to be made a Mason in his heart.

From The East



For those of you who were not able to attend the April Stated Communication, please allow me to provide a recap. As you know our Budget Committee (which was made a

permanent committee consisting of the Wardens and Senior Deacon) made a few recommendations during their presentation at the March Stated. One of which was to have semi-annual budget reports presented in Tiled Lodge, this recommendation was opened for discussion and later approved at the April Stated. Subsequent Budget Committee reports will be given at the June and December Stated Communications respectively.

Additionally a report on the Division Leadership Conference was provided. This report highlighted three of the Grand Master's areas of concern: first, an increase in the annual Grand Lodge Assessment from \$45 to \$55 beginning in 2018, the increase would subsequently raise our annual dues to \$117 (\$55 to Grand Lodge and \$62 to Kempsville Lodge); second, to either raise the cost of entry into the LMIP Program from 16 years dues to 25 years dues or to freeze membership in the program at its end of 2017 number; and third, to investigate the establishment of a Grand Lodge policy regarding concealed carry of firearms in Virginia Masonic Lodges. The first two issues will be voted on during Grand Annual Communication later in the year in Richmond. The disposition of the concealed carry policy has not been determined. I ask that you consider the issues and be ready to speak on them during the October Stated in preparation of my representation of you in Richmond in November.

Lastly, I presented a short program on Lodge and Temple building. During the Lodge building segment I presented a community service idea of volunteering our support of Kempsville High School by working in concession sales during football games. As this was only a personal idea. I asked that the Brothers consider the effort and be prepared for further discussion of that and other ideas they may have during the May Stated. The Temple building segment focused on infrastructure improvement, specifically adding an elevator and first floor unisex bathroom to our physical plant both of which would be usable by handicapped persons. The Officers and I intend to acquire cost estimates on the project in order to establish fund raising goals. Once those estimates are acquired I will request your thoughts during Tiled Lodge.

We, the Brothers of Kempsville Lodge, have much

to consider regarding how we shape the future of our Lodge and I sincerely ask for your attendance in Lodge during these discussions and at any other time you would like to come out and enjoy some good food and good fellowship. I hope to see you in Lodge soon!
