## **The Holy Bible – From Creation to the Temple.**

God's Word reveals His great purpose concerning the human family. He created Adam in His own image, perfect, free, sinless, with the power to choose between good and evil. Adam sinned, fell and spoiled God's plan concerning him. Then God began His great plan for redemption.

For at least 1,500 years men multiplied in the Earth and so did sin, until "God saw that wickedness of man was great in the Earth and that every imagination of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually" (GEN 6:5); so God made another beginning.



Commanding righteous Noah to build the Ark, He saved him and his family while He destroyed everyone and everything outside the Ark with a great flood.

Four hundred years later God again singles out a man of faith; calls Abraham out from his kindred and his people to make him a great nation, through whom His Word and His Son should be given to the world.

How is that nation made? One of Abraham's great grandsons is sold into Egypt. God sends a seven-year famine and Joseph's brethren go down to Egypt to buy corn. They find Joseph lord of all Egypt. Jacob and his eleven sons move to Egypt, where they increase mightily and later become enslaved.

There for two hundred years they are welded together in the fires of affliction until God raises up Moses, their deliverer, and they go forth out of Egypt to receive their code of laws, their organized church and priesthood, and forty years of discipline in the wilderness. Then they enter upon the conquest of Canaan and the possession of the promised land.

For more than three hundred years, during the time of Judges, their history is one of oppression when they forget God and deliverance from their enemies when they repented and turned again to Him.

These troublous times were followed by the kingdom under Saul, David and Solomon, when Israel's power and influence spread from Egypt to the Euphrates; their magnificent temple was built and Jerusalem became the religious center of the world.

King David, Solomon's father and predecessor on the throne of Israel, was forbidden by the Lord to build a temple because he was a man of war and had shed blood. He was assured, however, that his son would build the temple, and he was permitted to gather large sums of money and to make other preparations for its construction. Soon after his succession to the throne, Solomon planned to build the temple within a period of seven years. Hiram Abif, a skilled workman in metal, stone, and wood, was the principal architect and engineer.

Lots to report on, discuss, and look forward to for Kempsville Lodge. First I'd like to report on our Temple Building efforts. I have received information on our construction project and have met with one contractor who is a Master Mason in our Lodge. Our meeting went well and he is now in the process of getting an updated survey and bids from sub-contractors. Once his requirements have been satisfied he plans to give us a bid, which we can use to establish a fundraising campaign. I intend to include a few different components in the fundraising campaign but its centerpiece will most likely be in the form of pledge cards. More on that situation as it progresses.

Second, an edict from the Grand Master of Virginia was read in open Lodge at the May Stated Communication. The edict concerns the constitutional right of Americans (contained in the US Constitution Bill of Rights – 2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment) and more particularly Virginians (contained in the Constitution of Virginia – Section 13) to possess firearms on Masonic property. I intentionally did not open the topic for discussion in order to let all Master Masons whether present or not present to have time to consider the edict, and to express their feelings and opinions to the Lodge Officers. Please let me assure you that Kempsville Lodge will comply with all Grand Lodge edicts; however, I will comply with your wishes if there is a desire for me to convey any concern or support with our reply directed by edict.

WHY DOES THE RED CROSS CHECK ME FOR  
IRON LEVEL? Donating blood removes iron from  
your body. Your body needs iron to make new red  
blood cells. Low levels of iron can cause anemia or  
make it worse. All blood donors should learn more  
about iron and hemoglobin.

- Everyone should eat a nutritious, well-balanced diet.
- All blood donors should add foods rich in iron and high in vitamin C to their diet.
- The American Red Cross now recommends that

frequent blood donors take a multivitamin with iron or an iron-only supplement to replace the iron lost through each blood donation. You should consult with your health-care provider before taking an multivitamin with iron or an iron-only supplement.

- If you have been deferred from donating blood for low hemoglobin, you might have low iron levels.
- High Iron foods like potatoes, beef, fish, beans, spinach and whole grains will improve your count, also drink plenty of water instead of coffee the day of your donation.
