Communion on the Moon

There have been many firsts for man, for this great country, and for Freemasons. Two of those for man, for the United States, and for Freemasons are walking on the moon, and having Holy Communion on the moon. In 1969, two Brother Masons, Brother Buzz Aldrin and Brother Neil Armstrong, changed history by walking on the moon. But what happened before Brother Aldrin and Brother Armstrong exited the Lunar Module is perhaps even more amazing, if only because so few people know about it. The fact is Brother Aldrin took Holy Communion on the surface of the moon. Some months after his return, he wrote about it in Guideposts magazine.

The background to the story is that Brother Aldrin was an elder at his Presbyterian Church in Texas during this period in his life, and knowing that he would soon be doing something unprecedented in human history, he felt he should mark the occasion somehow, and he asked his minister to help him. The minister consecrated a communion wafer and a small vial of communion wine, and Brother Aldrin took them with him out of Earth's orbit and on to the surface of the moon. He and Brother Armstrong had only been on the surface for a few minutes when Brother Aldrin made the following statement.



"This is the LM pilot. I'd like to ask every person listening in, whoever and wherever they may be, to pause for a moment and contemplate the events of the past few hours and give thanks in his or her own way."

He then ended radio communication and there, on the silent surface of the moon, 250,000 miles from home, he then read a verse from the Gospel of John, and he took communion.

Here is his account of what happened. "In the radio blackout, I opened the little plastic packages which contained the bread and the wine. I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon, the wine slowly curled and gracefully came up the side of the cup. Then I read the Scripture.

"I am the vine, you are the branches. Whosoever abides in me will bring forth much fruit. Apart from me you can do nothing."

I had intended to read my communion passage back to Earth, but at the last minute they had requested that I not do this. NASA was already embroiled in a legal battle with Madelyn Murray O'Hare, the celebrated opponent of religion, over the Apollo 8 crew reading Genesis while orbiting the moon at Christmas. I agreed reluctantly. I ate the tiny Host and swallowed the wine. I gave thanks for the intelligence and spirit that had brought two young pilots to the Sea of Tranquility. It was interesting for me to think: the very first liquid ever poured on the moon, and the very first food eaten there, where the communion elements. And of course, it's interesting to think that some of the first words spoken on the moon were the words of Jesus Christ, who made the Earth and the moon—and who, in the poetic words of Dante, an Italian poet and philosopher, is Himself the "Love that moves the Sun and other stars."

Masonry Universal

Brethren, this month we will look at the history and practice of Masonry in Germany. Operative stonemason unions were formed in Germany as early as 1149. The first operative grand lodge of Masons was formed in the city of Cologne in 1250 as part of the building of that city's great cathedral.

The first speculative German Masonic lodge was established in December 1737, in one of the hundreds of patchwork states that would later become the German Empire. Before this, some Germans became Freemasons in English lodges. Provincial and Grand Lodges in Germany were formed several years later, in 1741. Various Masonic associations and federations would

subsequently be established, but they were never successful in unifying Masonry in Germany.

Freemasonry, along with other groups, was scapegoated in Germany for the loss of WW I. Masonry ceased to exist when the Nazi Interior Ministry ordered all ten independent Grand Lodges to be disbanded in May 1935. It wasn't until the end of World War II that German Masonic lodges were able to rebuild themselves in Berlin and Western Germany. Meanwhile, British, American and Canadian servicemen were holding Masonic meetings, and by the end of the 1940's they obtained warrants from their state Grand Lodges to establish their own lodges in Germany.

In June 1949, 174 of the reconstituted German lodges unified to form the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons in Germany. In April 1958, with the assistance of several foreign Grand Lodges (including the United Grand Lodge of England), the United Grand Lodges of Germany was formed. Each of the five member Grand Lodges, including the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons in Germany and the American Canadian Grand Lodge, maintained their sovereignty but would be represented to all foreign organizations and the public by the United Grand Lodge.

The organization of these five Grand Lodges varies. The structure of and Anglo-American ritual practiced by lodges under the American Canadian Grand Lodge would be familiar to American Masons. However, the Grand Lodge of the Freemasons of Germany follows a form of the Swedish Rite, which does not have appendant bodies but rather ten integrated degrees. These ten degrees are divided into three branches: the St. John's Lodge (equivalent to the Blue Lodge, or Craft Lodge) which works the first three Masonic degrees; the St. Andrew's Lodge, which works the IV^{th} to VI^{th} degrees; and the Chapters, which work the VIIth to Xth degrees.

There also exists a Women's Grand Lodge of Germany. It was founded in Berlin in 1949 and consists of 22 women-only Lodges. While this Women's Grand Lodge and the United Grand Lodges of Germany recognize each other, they have no official ties.
