The Bible

A book of books. Thousands of years ago it was said "Of making many books, there is no end." If it was true then, how much more true is it in these days, when the printing press is pouring forth a ceaseless stream of books. Yet among all the books ever written, the Bible is by far the most precious.

The world is full of books of every kind and character, written by men of every land and profession, yet none of them can for one moment compare with this one book. It records history, the oldest in the world: reaching back to the creation of all things. Many recorded events, once discredited by Bible critics as not only improbable, but impossible, have been proven authentic by discovery, in recent years, of records and tablets buried for thousands of years in ruins of cities and palaces of kings, who lived at the same time as the events recorded in Bible history occurred.

Many of its prophesies uttered thousands of years before have had their fulfillment in a wonderful manner.



and others point still to the future. No other book presents so lofty a conception of the relation of the Creator to the human family as does the Bible: God walking, talking with, and through His Son, dying for men. Nor can any other book compare with its influence on and uplift of mankind.

We speak of the Bible as one book. In reality, however, it is a small library, a set of sixty-six books, smaller and larger, that have been bound in one volume. They have various authors led by the inspiration of God's Holy Spirit, numbering about thirty-six in all. The oldest of these is Moses, the Hebrew Prophet and Lawgiver, who wrote about 1,500 years before Christ.

Many of these Spirit guided authors were unlearned men, yet there came from the strokes of their rude pens, characters immortal: everlasting characters, that stand like rocks among the waves of time; created in a few words, by a bare record of great things said and done. The latest author is John the Evangelist, who wrote the Revelation, about 100 years after Christ. So we see the Bible was about 1,600 years in preparation. No other single book has such a chronological record as this.

And what shall we say when we come to the matter of the religious teachings that are contained in this book? Search in all the religious writings of the heathen world for anything that can be compared with the Ten Commandments. In all the world they have become the foundation of good law and government. No other code of morals in the world sets so lofty a standard nor has any other code of laws ever been framed, whose observance so enhances the common good of mankind. Jesus said the sum of the Ten Commandment is, "To love the Lord with all thy heart and thy neighbor as thyself."

Yet still more lofty in its conception of Divine truth than the Ten Commandments is the Sermon on the Mount of our blessed Lord. Here we have the law laid down, as it applies not to the outward life only, but as it appeals to the human heart and conscience.

Masonry Universal - France (Part 2)

This month we will complete our discussion of the history and practice of Freemasonry in France. The political turmoil that gripped that country from the late 1700s through the second half of the 1800s is the backdrop for much of this.

Freemasons took part in both the Republican and monarchical (royal) camps during the French Revolution of 1789. Even though the Grand Orient (the French Masonic Grand Lodge) proclaimed its attachment to the democratic form of government, it was forced to cease its activities during the Revolution's Reign of Terror between 1793 and 1796. Of the nearly 1000 lodges that were active on the eve of the Revolution, only 75 were in a fit state to resume their activities in 1800.

When the First French Empire of Napoleon I was declared in 1804, Masons learned (after the fact) that his brother Joseph had been named Grand Master of Masons in France. Masonry would remain under strict control of the political authorities while expanding to over 1200 lodges. It would, as a result, fall to less than less than 300 lodges five years after Napoleon's defeat. The following decades would see more turmoil as France shifted back to two different monarchies, a Second Republic, and then back to a Second Empire under Napoleon's nephew. He, like his

uncle, offered his protection to French Freemasonry.

The Third French Republic, established in 1871, wished to open secular schools throughout its territory and so entered into an open conflict with the Catholic Church, which opposed these schools. It was in this context that the Grand Orient decided in 1877 to abolish its requirement that its members believe in the existence of God and the immortality of the soul. The decision to admit Atheists was not universally approved in France and led, in 1894, to a schism in French Freemasonry.

French Freemasonry would subsequently suffer additional splits, fractures, and turmoil in the following years. A thousand French Freemasons were deported or killed during the Second World War. It wasn't until twenty years after the end of the conflict that French Freemasonry regained its pre-war numbers. Today, there are 11 Grand Lodges in France; most of these do not officially recognize the others. These include a mix of menonly, mixed gender, and women-only lodges.

Life Membership in Perpetuity

To Brethren who have not purchased Life Membership in Perpetuity (LMIP), but may be interested to do so:

At the recent Grand Lodge session, the cost of LMIP was changed, effective January 1, 2018, and

will increase (see below). If you think you might want to purchase an LMIP before it increases, it must be paid in full and at the Grand Lodge office before December 31, 2017.

Section 5.03 of the Virginia Methodical Digest be modified to increase, over a period of three years, the multiple for an LMIP purchase from sixteen (16) times dues to twenty-five (25) times dues in the following manner; January 1, 2018 change multiple to twenty-one (21) times annual dues, January 1, 2019 change multiple to twenty-three (23) times annual dues, and January 1, 2020 change multiple to twenty-five (25) times annual dues.
