Observations of Masonry in Spain

Worshipful Roger asked my wife Daphne and me to put an Ashlar article together about all things Masonic that we saw, that we didn't see, and that were provided to us by local experts while we were in Ireland and Spain enjoying our honeymoon earlier this summer.

Our first stop, albeit an unplanned stop due to a late departure from Philadelphia was in Dublin, Ireland. We were only there for one day and we were able to visit Saint Audoen's Church, which is part of the Church of England. The church was built between 1181 and 1212 by stonemasons during the Gothic Age. We noticed some Freemason symbols in the church so we inquired of the curator regarding their origin. This person told us that stonemason guilds were active in Ireland long before the building of the church and that local Freemason Lodges have been documented in Ireland long before 1717. He said probably as early as the 1200s. I don't know this to be fact and I have not researched it, but it is what the man told us.



After leaving Ireland we went on to Spain, which was in line with our plans. Many thanks to Aer Lingus for putting us up and for all the free food we ate while we were in Ireland. In Spain we visited many towns and sites: Madrid, Avila, Segovia, Toledo, Granada, Barcelona, and Montserrat. We didn't really see much about Freemasonry (we actually didn't really look to be honest) until we reached Barcelona and took the guided tour titled Masonic Barcelona. Spain being a predominantly Catholic country, we did see many Knights Templar churches which had symbols that a person may regard as Masonic. I'll let you research the Templar – Freemason connection for yourselves, a good start if you are interested would be the book titled The Temple and the Lodge.

The Masonic Barcelona Tour lasted about 4 hours and was largely in the Gothic Quarter of the city. Our tour guide was a historian and a Catholic from Germany who has lived in Barcelona for about 40 years, he is not a Freemason and has no intention of becoming one. He took us to at least a dozen sites and showed us many valid Freemason symbols that were placed on various buildings by Freemasons; I will add that in my opinion not everything he showed us was a valid Freemason symbol. He said that Freemasonry in Spain could be documented to the early 1700s but it became most prominent in Barcelona in 1808 when the French were in power, but it disappeared with the overthrow of the French around 1813. He did add that Freemasonry never truly left Spain, he said that Freemasonry continued to be a part of Spanish society from that time until 1936 when Francisco Franco came to power. He said that Franco aspired to become a Freemason but was never admitted into the Lodge because of his heavy-handed rule of the Spanish people. Because of not being admitted, Franco persecuted the Masonic Lodge in a similar manner that Hitler persecuted German Freemason Lodges during the same time. He said that between 1936 and 1979 Freemasonry again went underground and again was a true secret society until after the death of Franco and Freemasonry later being officially legalized.

Today Freemasonry is alive and well in Spain. Our guide did inform us that Freemasonry in Spain is very liberal and is not aligned with traditional Freemasonry in other parts of the world (e.g. women and atheists are allowed membership in the Lodge). Daphne and I greatly enjoyed the tour, and our time in Ireland and Spain. I'm not so sure that I would recommend taking the Masonic Barcelona Tour, but I would definitely recommend taking your wife on vacation to Spain. The two of us are around the Lodge quite a bit, and would welcome a conversation with anyone who would like to visit the country.
