

31 Miles for 31 Heroes

On August 6, 2011, a tragedy shook the military community and Americans everywhere. In a single instance, America lost 30 military service members, many of whom were members of the Navy SEAL community—and one military K9- when a CH-47 Chinook helicopter, call sign Extortion 17, was downed in Afghanistan. Of these, 25 were Navy SEALs, three were United States Army Reserve, and two were United States Army National Guard. An additional eight were members of the Afghan National Security Forces. Extortion 17 was on its way to reinforce an operation against a senior Taliban leader when it was shot down. At 31 U.S. military personnel killed, the loss of Extortion 17 was the greatest single-incident loss of U.S. lives in Operation Enduring Freedom - Afghanistan,

Brother Keith Ingraham, our Lodge Chaplain, was deployed, worked with and knew many of these men. But for the fact that he had transferred one month prior to the shootdown of Extortion 17, he might have been among their number. Each year, Brother Keith, a Senior Chief Electronics Technician in the United States Navy, and other Service members and Veterans who worked with and knew these men, honor their memory and sacrifice in a very special way.



In the wake of this unimaginable tragedy, a mission was born. Following the downing of Extortion 17, a fundraising workout day - hosted at more than 430 gyms around the country with more than 10,000 participants - raised \$300,000 over a four-week period to support the 30 families affected. This success prompted the organizers to create the "31Heroes" organization to remember our fallen heroes and take care of their loved ones. This eventually led to the establishment of the "31Miles for 31Heroes" event.

"31Miles for 31Heroes" is a 31-mile march with a ruck sack through the night to honor the lives of the Heroes of Extortion 17. Some participants carry 2 bricks in their rucks - one to represent the lives of the fallen and the other to represent the burden carried by their families. Some carry 31 pounds of weight to represent the 31 US lives lost. The main march starts each year at the Lincoln Memorial and visits 30 other monuments before ending up at the memorial to the men of Extortion 17 at Arlington National Cemetery. Similar marches are also conducted in Tampa, Florida. All funds raised benefit 31Heroes and the families who are similarly affected both today and in the future.

Although Brother Keith regularly participates in the march, this year the event had to be done "virtually" with smaller groups of people due to the COVID-19 pandemic. For Brother Keith, this meant marching 31 miles in one day in our local area with his ruck sack to honor his fallen comrades. Well done Brother!

Their Worshipful Master, Peter Bland, visited our Lodge several times in the past and kindly invited us to join him and his Lodge back in September. This has been a wonderful opportunity for fellowship and to learn more about Masonry in our respective countries. All Brothers are welcome and encouraged to join us.

Although there is only one month left in this Masonic year, we still have a lot left to do, including collecting contributions for Thanksgiving dinners and the Salvation Army Angel Tree program, delivery of poinsettias to our Widows, and preparations for our Annual Stated meeting and Officer installation on December 8th. We are looking forward to it all!
